MANGAHEWA NEWS

It was wonderful to see so many Tikorangi residents out enjoying WOMAD this year, in what was one of the best weather weekends of the summer. Todd has been busy with the new office facility at the McKee Mangahewa Production Station, where the building construction started at the end of April.

The Mangahewa compression units at the Production Station are now ready to be connected to the pipeline network. This commissioning process will result in some flaring activity at the Mangahewa C and D well sites. Further details on this operation can be found on the back of the newsletter.

Recent operations at Mangahewa D have been successful and we are currently planning a second hydraulic fracturing campaign towards the beginning of June. We will be conducting a letter drop in mid-May to provide details of this campaign.

The Mangahewa Seismic Survey is nearing completion. Drilling and recording are now complete. Restoration is approximately 80% complete, with de-permitting ongoing and due to finish end of May.

Thank you to everyone who has assisted with the campaign.

Commissioning the Mangahewa Compression Units

At the end of May the Mangahewa compression units will begin a commissioning phase. This phase involves stopping gas flow to the Plant from four wells at Mangahewa D.

The operation of stopping gas flow to the Plant is necessary for a safe tie-in when connecting the compression units to the pipeline network.

When stopping gas flow to the Plant, this results in flaring activity at the respective well sites. The flaring activity will likely last for approximately five days. We will be distributing further details via a letter drop closer to the time. If you have any immediate concerns or you would like to discuss this operation further, please contact the community team on 0800 001 007.

With this shutdown activity occurring, we will use the opportunity to conduct other upgrades at the Plant and some other maintenance at Mangahewa C wellsite, reducing the requirement for further shutdowns later in 2017.

Todd purchases remaining 50% of Kapuni

Todd Energy has signed agreements to acquire Shell's 50% interest in the Kapuni onshore natural gas field.

Once we have received consent from the Minister of Energy and Resources, Todd will own the Kapuni natural gas field and will assume operatorship from Shell Todd Oil Services, who are the current operator at Kapuni.

The handover of operatorship will be completed around mid-year 2017.

Todd and Shell have been partners in the Kapuni field since the exploration permit was issued in 1950s. With Shell seeking to exit the New Zealand market it was felt that Todd was the natural owner of Shell's interest in the Kapuni field.
