Kia ora koutou, and welcome to the September issue of our Todd Energy community update. The springtime weather is certainly upon us and it's fantastic to be able to enjoy a little more sunshine and warmth over the last few weeks.

I'm pleased to share that we have successfully completed the civil works at our Mangahewa D wellsite in north Taranaki as scheduled. These works are an important step for our wellsite extension project and will ensure we are well-placed to commence the drilling of up to 12 new wells.

With the wellsite expansion work now fully completed, we have also been able to successfully mobilise our Big Ben drilling rig from our Kapuni J site in south Taranaki. The rig is now stacked at the newly extended Mangahewa D site, and

we are currently planning to commence our four well drilling campaign sometime in the next 18 months. We will keep you updated on this development activity.

I do want to acknowledge our neighbours and community members for their patience and understanding during what has been a busy time on the roads in the area. Thank you for your continued support for our activities.

In south Taranaki, we've just commenced stimulation and testing operations on the three new wells drilled as part of our Kapuni J Phase 2 campaign which was successfully completed at the end of August. The current well entry operations are scheduled to run through to November, with up to 80 team members on site during this time.

On behalf of our Community team, thank you to those of you who joined us at our recent Tikorangi Consultation Forum in mid-September, and we look forward to seeing others at our upcoming Kapuni CAG Meeting in mid-October. Planning is also underway for our open Tikorangi Community Meeting, which will be held at the Clifton Rugby Clubrooms on 21 November, and our open Kapuni Community Meeting, which will be held on 23 November – more information on this will follow over the coming weeks.


Todd Energy also confirmed its support for the waterfront development Destination Play, coming on board as a Kāwaroa Partner to help bring the community project to life.

Creating hope with Waimanako: The Hope Centre


The team at Taranaki Retreat are all about supporting people when times are tough.


